And the walk starts..




RDO, Mr. Rama Rao met us on the way and appreciated our Walk for cause and extended his support to us.

Here the story of **Mastan Saida** was discussed, an Inventer of a productive custom windmill with very cheap resources he had.

Mr. Panduranga, the innovator who made air-seal bike tube was the hero of our next story shared by Brig. This innovation brought out in CSY-9, my second yatra.




By the evening we reached Palvaay village, interaction with villagers happened by showcasing the innovations of their sort people to encourage them.
